
Thank you to everyone who donated to the Angel Scholarship Fund in 2022! This is a new program that allows Ohio taxpayers to claim a tax credit on their state tax by donating to this scholarship fund. As of Dec. 31, \$83,750 in donations to the Angel Scholarship Fund were designated to St. Sebastian Parish School! That is simply fantastic! All of this money

(minus any fees or corrections still being finalized) will be used for scholarships for our families. Already, \$12,200 was designated for this school year, and the rest of the funds are designated for the 2023-24 school year. We hope that this big, positive impact for our families will encourage even more donations for the 2023 tax year! Information on how to apply for an Angel Fund Scholarship will be provided to families soon.

### **Blue Ribbon School Application**

I am happy to report that St. Sebastian Parish School completed and submitted the lengthy application for the National Blue Ribbon Schools Program at the end of December. This is the first time we are aware of that our school has achieved test scores high enough to qualify, although we have been just on the cusp for many years. The graphic above depicts these scores. Across all three testing windows (fall, winter, spring) for the 2021-22 school year, our students earned both high growth and high achievement ratings in all subject areas as recorded by the MAP tests (Measures of Academic Progress). Our students scored above 85% of all students taking the test in all four subject areas (math, reading, language, and science). Our school community should be very proud of this!

However, applying for the Blue Ribbon award was no small task, requiring much more than achieving high test scores. The application required a great deal of data collection and input as well as nearly 7,500 words in narrative descriptions! Thank you to all the teachers and staff who worked on the application; it was truly a team effort that resulted in a wonderful showcase of all that is great about St. Sebastian Parish School! I look forward to sharing it with you once we have completed the review process. We should find out in the next month or so if we are chosen to be among the 50 private



schools nationwide to be nominated. If our school is nominated, we would have to wait until September to find out if we are among the winners selected by the U.S. Department of Education.

### **Weller Update**

Weller has progressed nicely over the past year with his training, and after his surgery, he remains a happy and healthy puppy for the most part. Thank you for your continued prayers for him. He really enjoys coming to school to see the students, teachers, and families,

and he especially likes morning drop-off, when he eagerly greets the students. He has recently successfully passed his AKC Canine Good Citizen class, which concluded with a test of 10 skills. Weller will begin taking his therapy dog assessments in February.

## From the STEM Coordinators

**Grades K-3, by Susan Vernon** 

Fall is the perfect season to capitalize on STEM activities, and the primary grades had some exciting adventures during the second quarter! Karen Swartz's 1st-grade students and their 6th-grade buddies worked together in the Innovation Lab to complete several learning activities with pumpkins. Students learned about a pumpkin's life cycle, and then they



measured the height, weight, and circumference of pumpkins, counted seeds, and wrote a list of descriptive adjectives. They also conducted an experiment to see if the pumpkins would sink or float. Finally, they carved the pumpkins to make some great jack-o-lanterns! Michelle Antochow's 3rd-grade students used the writing process — brainstorming, drafting, editing, and publication — for the first time in November. They partnered with a peer to edit the essays they wrote on gratitude. Finally, they added a beautifully colored cover sheet. We might have some future editors in our 3rd grade!

Our annual Literature Day was held just before Thanksgiving break for the primary grades. Teachers selected favorite stories to share and paired them with exciting activities. Students traveled to the different classrooms to listen to amazing stories and collect a bag full of great projects! Just before Christmas, all classes used STEM engineering and design skills to create beautiful gifts for their families. Favorites include glass ornaments with a ribbon inside that was cut to the height of each student, a wooden reindeer ornament painted with fingerprints, glass bulbs of glitter, hand-painted ceramic ornaments, and special picture frames. Finally, all the students used their math skills to carefully calculate the price of purchases at Santa Shop, a service provided by HASA. A BIG thank you to all volunteers who served as personal shoppers for our students. St. Sebastian Parish School has the BEST shopping experience ever!

### **Grades 4-6, by Jennifer Slegus**

The 4th-grade students have been busy with many STEM-based activities during the second quarter. Students read the book "Balloons Over Broadway," which details how inventor Tony Sarg was commissioned to create the first Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade balloons. The students were presented with the conundrum that there was a shortage of helium, but the parade




must still go on! They were tasked with creating not only a balloon, but also a device for holding the balloon "afloat" during the parade. After much planning, collaborating, and creating, the students paraded around the building, showing off their amazing creations! The students also learned about the California Gold Rush in a crosscurricular (social studies and geometry) STEM activity in which they created a map based upon John Sutter's Mill in Sacramento, California, during 1848. While creating the map, they explored

different types of lines and line segments, shapes, area, and perimeter. They also completed an integrated Native American unit, learning about Ohio tribes in social studies class and then reading the book "The Sign of the Beaver." They designed slideshow presentations for the tribe they researched and constructed different projects such as replica artifacts, weapons, and scale model homes.

Our 5th-grade classes are participating in a STEM design challenge through the Ohio Energy Project called the MacGyver Wind Lift Challenge. While studying energy and motion, the students are learning about alternative sources of energy. The students created a wind turbine to capture energy from the wind to lift as many pennies as possible. This quarter, 6thgrade students brought history to life by planning, designing, and creating ancient city states. Students built 3D models of ancient city states out of recyclable materials to include the step pyramids, lush gardens, and the city center. Once their creations were brought to life, students presented their unique designs to the class. The 6th-grade classes also completed "Gizmo" activities (virtual, interactive STEM simulations) to learn about renewable and nonrenewable resources. They also researched food pricing to put together a meal for Thanksgiving with given parameters of food requirements and budget restrictions.

**Grades 7-8, by Megan Sanford** 

The school science fair for grades 7-8 was held Dec. 6 in Z-Hall. All junior high students created projects to demonstrate their mastery of the scientific method and to further research a topic that interests them. The students presented their projects to parents and a panel of judges. Many thanks to our volunteer



judges, including former St. Sebastian science teacher Betty Indriolo; high school science teachers Robert Engels (STVM), Suzanne Maloney (Walsh), Gregory Pero (Hoban), Kylie Riedel (STVM), and Diane Vrobel (Hoban); and Laura Chapin and Tracey Coates, parents with science backgrounds. All of the students did an outstanding job with this event, and awards were presented to the top three projects in each grade. For the list of winners, please see the Students in the News section of this newsletter. Good luck to all those who will compete in the Regional Science Fair on Feb.11 at Walsh Jesuit High School!

In 7th-grade classes, students have been learning about the different components of weather (temperature, wind speed/direction, humidity, precipitation, visibility, and air pressure) and how to measure them. Students have also been learning about predictions and how to connect evidence, explanations, and observations to conduct logical and knowledgeable analysis. In science class, 8th-grade students have been studying plate tectonics, seismic activity, and the Earth's geologic time scale. Students were tasked with building towers that could withstand an earthquake to demonstrate their understanding of earthquake-resistant engineering processes. Additionally students made their own fossils using plaster and clay and practiced carbon dating techniques with M&M candy. Before Christmas break, students learned about chemical reactions and crystals while making snowflakes out of Borax.

The top grade-band earners and readers are as follows: grades K-2: Charlotte Conrad raised \$310, Levi Dunn read 1,132 minutes; grades 3-5: Aubrey Coates and Maxon Girard-Toth each raised \$400. Charlotte Ryan read 2,189 minutes; grades 6-8: Talen Bills raised \$299, Gage Caruthers read 1,250 minutes. ### Santa Shop


