To bridge the gap between last year's salaries and our target structure, we are implementing a combination of raises and bonuses this year and next, keeping us on track to meet our target by the 2026–2027 school year. This plan, informed by valuable data from the diocese and local markets—including both public and Catholic schools—allows us to roll out a new step salary schedule for our teachers, acknowledging their invaluable role and commitment to our mission. Thank you for making this possible—your support directly impacts our teachers, our students, and the future of Catholic education at St. Sebastian Parish School.

FROM THE STEM COORDINATORS

Grades K-3, by Sue Vernon

This quarter the spotlight shines on the 2nd grade and kindergarten! Our kindergarteners took advantage of the bright fall days and went leaf collecting. They really appreciated our beautiful campus! Kindergarteners also showed their engineering skills by building marshmallow towers! Wow!

The second graders met with their 6th–grade buddies to practice the Engineering Design Process. Their challenge? Create a special jack–o-lantern with limited materials. The students worked well together as they brainstormed, organized, and then created a plan for their design. During a second meeting, the partners executed their plan. The finished products were impressive! Our 2nd–grade students also met in the innovation lab to work on a Project Wet activity. The children learned about the water cycle through experiments and even made a portable diagram to bring home! Finally, 2nd–graders welcomed Halloween with some scary skeletons. They traced their hands and drew in all the bones. Using Q–tips and vegetable oil, they painted over the bones and hung them in the windows to mimic X–rays! Spooky!

Grades 4-6, by Jen Slegus

We have been busy in the middle grades! The 4th-grade students' first activity this school year was to "Save Fred". They worked with partners to save a gummy worm that had fallen into a lake and could not swim. They were given specific tools to use but were not allowed to use their hands. The students have also been learning about different animal and plant adaptations. The students completed a simulation lab where they discovered the differences and similarities of birds' beaks. They used different tools (ex: toothpicks for spearing and clothespins for pinching) and imaginary food (ex: beans for grubs and marbles for snails) to show how well birds' beaks are adapted for eating their specific food. During math class, the students were given a challenge to design their own haunted house. They had to decide on a theme, design a floor plan with specific requirements, and then create it on an online grid system where they calculated the area and perimeter of the rooms.

The 5th-grade class has been busy with the steps of the Scientific Method and the Engineering Design Process. The 5th-grade students were tasked with a job from their "customer", Mrs. Friedl. They were given criteria and constraints, and challenged to build as many paper airplanes as they could in five minutes. The students chose which plane design to use in order to optimize their outcome. Their products were tested by measuring the total distance obtained by their five minutes of work. The 5th-graders also used research, digital tools, and their learning of animal adaptations to simulate food webs in real time.

The 6th-grade class completed a measurement lab where they explored measuring flat and round objects. They also used the Engineering and Design process to create Lego pumpkins with their 2nd-grade buddies.









Grades 7-8, by Megan Sanford

In 7th grade, students studied the engineering design process, empirical evidence, and the scientific method, especially how it will apply to their Science Fair project coming up. We have been busy doing scientific investigations and STEM activities to explore concepts learned in class. The students participated in an H2Olympics Project Wet Lab where they learned about cohesion, adhesion and surface tension. They also enjoyed a lab using candy pumpkins and different liquids (water, milk, Sprite, and vinegar) to explore the scientific method.

In 8th-grade science students studied experimental design and data analysis this quarter. Students have conducted several classroom experiments to practice their skills of writing procedures, testing hypotheses, measurement, data collection and analysis. Several of these experimental design tasks are from our Project Wet curriculum. For example, students completed a lab called "Is there water on Zork?" During this activity the students had to run a series of tests to determine which clear liquid was water. The tests included checking the substance's physical and chemical properties such as reactivity, solubility, density, pH, odor, and cohesiveness. In their recent data project students took on the role of CDC medical researchers to look for trends causing a zombie outbreak. Students discussed important statistical topics like central tendency, organizing data, variation, and correlation. The 8th-graders also attended the Cleveland Metroparks Watershed Stewardship Center for their stream ecology program. Students were able to explore a local stream to learn how it functions as an ecosystem. While at the stream the students studied the water chemistry and completed habitat assessments. Additionally, students got some time in the classroom, learning about erosion and deposition with their interactive stream table.

All students in grades 7-8 are preparing science fair projects on a topic of their choice. Science fair is an opportunity for students to apply the scientific method to independently research an idea and design an experiment. Science fair projects give our students an opportunity to explore science outside of the standard curriculum. It teaches life skills of inquiry, design, time management, and communication. Exceptional projects may advance to compete in the regional or district fair.

ST. SEBASTIAN WINS 6TH STEM EDUCATION AWARD

For the sixth year in a row, St. Sebastian Parish School earned the Governor's Thomas Edison Award for Excellence in STEM Education and Student Research! Flight 93 Memorial Field Trip







In September, our 8th-grade students took part in an important and reverent field trip to the Flight 93 Memorial in Shanksville, PA. This visit has become a cherished tradition for our 8th-grade class, and we are proud to have been able to continue it for the seventh year in a row, offering this profound experience at no cost to our parents. During the visit, our students toured the crash site and the Flight 93 National Museum, where they had the opportunity to learn about and reflect on the tragic events of September 11, 2001. The day was made even more meaningful by a talk from one of the national park rangers, who shared insights and stories that deepened the students' understanding of the heroism and sacrifice that occurred on that day. This field trip not only serves as an educational experience but also as a powerful reminder of the courage and resilience demonstrated by the passengers and crew of Flight 93. We are grateful to be able to offer our students this opportunity to connect with history in such a meaningful way.

Fall Sports Wrap-Up Cross Country and Soccer

For the 4th year in a row, our boys grades 6-8 team won the CYO Cross Country Championship. James Sellers was the top CYO individual champion, and three other runners scored in the top 10: Nathanial Chuba (3rd), Pete Kindbom (5th), and Evan Rea (9th). For girls team, Maddie Sellers placed 19th in the CYO Championship. At the state level, our boys team for grades 7-8 took 3rd place, and our boys team for grades 6 and under won the Ohio Cross Country State Middle School Championships! Individual runners who made the podium for grades 6 and under are James Sellers (4th) and Pete Kindbom (7th), and Simon Borges finished 9th in the grades 7-8 race. In soccer, our grades 5-6 Boys Gold Team earned the CYO Runners Up placement. We are very proud of our athletic Terrier teams!


